This voting record covers only <u>recorded</u> floor votes of the Iowa Senate and Iowa House that are of utmost importance to labor. Thus, unfortunately, not all of our priorities are in the record, and we must use other means to determine legislators' positions on those issues until such time as there is an official vote. This record does, however, serve as a tool to help Iowa trade unionists assess whether or not their elected representatives support an agenda that benefits all workers, organized or not.

The Iowa Federation of Labor also scores the Governor's actions so members can understand the record of the executive branch of government. Legislation that the IFL supported or opposed, that a Governor signs, vetoes, or line-item vetoes will also be scored, as well.

We have two big problems with the law. First, previously charter schools have been managed by the local school board, and this law bypasses the local elected leaders, and puts the charter schools under the supervision of Iowa's Department of Education. Secondly, although these schools would be a non-profit organization, this law allows for a charter school to be managed by a forprofit companies. This bill bans the use of design-build bidding at the Iowa Board of Regents which is the only public entity that can use the bidding practice. Design-build combines the designer and the builder and has been proven to lower costs and speed up project timelines. Design-build is the fastest growing and most popular method for construction and is used widely in the private sector.

Although, this is a higher percentage than state legislature appropriated during the previous year, the pandemic kept many children from returning to school as the COVID-19 pandemic continued throughout 2020/2021 school year. Funding is based on per pupil attendance of the previous year so with less people attending school in 20/21 there will be less money for the 21-22 school year even though attendance numbers will likely return close to a normal year.
12	SF 361 - EMPLOYER DRUG TESTING  IFL POSITION: OPPOSED  BILL PASSED SENATE 30-17 3 Absent or Not Voting  BILL NOT TAKEN UP BY HOUSE	<ol> <li>Two big changes were made that benefited the employer:</li> <li>Changed the definition of "Safety-sensitive position" to allow the employer to designate which job they feel could cause significant property damage, environmental damage, bodily injury, or death. This allows too much employer discretion in picking which employees are drug tested.</li> <li>The burden of proof is shifted from the employer to the employee. Currently, if an employee brings an action under IA Code Section 730.5 alleging a wrongful termination, the employer must prove that it complied with the requirements of the statute. Under the proposal, employees would have to prove that the employer did not comply with the statute. The problem with the burden shifting is that it is the employer's decision to enact a drug and alcohol testing policy, and if it is alleged the employer violated the policy and/or the law, the employer should be obligated to prove that its actions were in accordance with its policy and/or the law.</li> </ol>
13	SF 389 - PUBLIC ASSISTANCE OVERSIGHT CHANGE IFL POSITION: OPPOSED BILL PASSED SENATE 30-18 2 Absent or Not Voting BILL NOT TAKEN UP BY HOUSE	This creates new definitions for public assistance programs like Medicaid, SNAP (food assistance) and Children's Health Insurance Program. Goes into great detail on asset verification including using the value of a second vehicle against their total assets of the applicant. DHS is already working on ways to strengthen the oversight of these programs. This bill would add additional hurdles for people who sign up for assistance and could potentially kick 50,000 people off of food assistance. In 2019 a little more than 318,000 people used the food assistance program and it already has strict requirements that list what types of food are acceptable.
14	SF 496 - NONCOMPETE AGREEMENTS WITH LOW-WAGE EMPLOYEES  IFL POSITION: SUPPORT  BILL PASSED SENATE 45-0 5 Absent or Not Voting  BILL NOT TAKEN UP BY HOUSE	Prohibits employers from entering non-compete agreements with employees who earn an average monthly wage that is less than or equal to \$14.50 per hour.  Non-compete agreements are restricting workers from moving on to other jobs and advancing their careers. The Economic Policy Institute estimates that between 27-46% of private sector workers are subject to non-competes. Agreements vary but tend to restrict the worker with a period of time and by geographical area if the employee finds other work in a similar field. These agreements affect all types of workers: blue collar, white collar, fast food, hair salons and even apprentices in the construction trades.

A delivery agent is only allowed to deliver a maximum of two ballots. If a voter is not blind or disabled, someone living in the same household or a family member to the 4th degree of consanguinity can return another persons ballot.
