The **UAW International Bowling Finals** will take place on Saturday, May 16, 2026, at Thunderbowl Lanes located at 4200 Allen Road, Allen Park, MI 48101.

#### **ELIGIBILITY**

The 2026 UAW International Bowling Finals are open to:

- ► All ACTIVE members in good standing, and their legally recognized spouse/partner
- ► All RETIRED members paying dues to an active UAW Local Retiree Chapter, and their legally recognized spouse/partner

It is the responsibility of the respective local union's Financial Secretary to verify the qualifications of participants in the regional tournament.

All participating bowlers, active, retired, or spouse/partner, must have bowled and advanced in their Regional Bowling Qualifiers.

Regional tournaments must start <u>after</u> January 1, 2026, and be completed by Sunday, **April 12, 2026**. All scores should be submitted to the International Bowling Coordinator no later than **Friday**, **April 24, 2026**. Only teams that have participated in a Regional Qualifying Tournament can advance to the UAW Finals.

#### 2026 UAW INTERNATIONAL BOWLING FINALS RULES AND REGULATIONS

#### 1. ELIGIBILITY:

The 2026 UAW International Bowling Finals are open to ACTIVE UAW members in good standing, RETIRED UAW members in good standing, paying dues to an active UAW Local Retiree Chapter, and the legally recognized spouse/partner of eligible ACTIVE or RETIRED participants.

All participating bowlers must be verified by their respective local union Financial Secretary and must have bowled and advanced in their Regional Bowling Qualifiers.

Teams may be composed of all men, all women, or blended with a playing strength of five. USBC and eligible non-USBC members may participate in a moral support tournament, with high score recognition automatically extended to USBC members. Non-USBC members can obtain high score recognition by purchasing a membership card prior to bowling.

#### 2. REGIONAL QUALIFIERS:

Any UAW-sponsored (10-pin) tournament affiliating with this event must be standardized to include a Team Event and have identical average and eligibility rules and the same handicap systems. All team members must meet eligibility requirements as defined above.

All participating bowlers must be an ACTIVE or RETIRED member of a local union located within the region of the regional qualifying tournament. A bowler can participate only once in a UAW regional qualifying tournament.

Regional competition will be three games across two lanes. The International Final competition will be three games across two lanes, for both Single and Team competition. Qualifying scores will be based on the total score for three games with a handicap added.

Regions may advance teams to the UAW Finals Bowling Championship Tournament using the formulas on page 22.

#### 3. LOCAL AFFILIATION & REGISTRATION FEES:

It is the responsibility of the Team Captain to inform their Local Union if members of their team belong to another Local Union within their region. Local Union dues dollars should not be used to pay registration fees for members belonging to another Local Union.

Local unions and bowlers should note that there is no obligation for locals or regions to pay expenses for Regional Qualifiers or the UAW International Bowling Finals.

#### 4. AVERAGES:

Regional Qualifying Tournaments and the UAW International Bowling Finals will use a bowler's highest league average -- 21 GAMES OR MORE IN 2024-2025 (refer to City or appropriate Association Yearbook). Averages established in summer leagues will be acceptable only if such averages have been recorded and maintained by the local association secretary and are verifiable. Bring verification from the league secretary.

In case of no 2024-2025 average, said bowler may establish an average by bowling 21 games or more as of December 31, 2025. If an average is established in this manner, the highest established current average at the start of the tournament will be used. Bring verification from the league secretary. All others bowl scratch: men 200, women 165.

When the previous season's average is used, and at the time of the scheduled date of bowling, an entrant has a current average for 21 or more games that is 10 or more pins higher than the prior season's average, the CURRENT AVERAGE MUST BE USED. Bring verification of the current average from the league secretary.

#### 5. AVERAGE VERIFICATION AND RE-RATING:

It shall be each bowler's responsibility to verify the accuracy of their average. It shall be the team captain's responsibility to verify the accuracy of their team averages, whether originally submitted by the bowler, the team captain, or others. Failure to use the proper average or make a correction prior to or at the time of bowling may disqualify the team's score if the submitted average is lower than the actual average. Prize winnings shall be based on the submitted average if it is higher than the actual average (Rule 319A-3).

The Tournament Director will re-rate averages based on prior tournament scores. Bowlers are cautioned to familiarize themselves with the re-rating requirements of USBC Rule #319E and Rule #319. Rule #319 applies to all participants. Any bowler whose average has been re-rated by their local association must use their re-rated average in qualifying and finals tournaments.

Any bowler who has qualified for a prize of \$300 or more in any event in a tournament within the previous 12-month period must report their actual score, position, and amount won at the time of entry and is subject to possible re-rating before bowling. Failure to accurately report averages and/or prize winnings can result in disqualification. If the contestant reports a higher average than the true average, no correction will be made, and they will be handicapped accordingly. If a lower average than the true average is submitted, the contestant may be disqualified and subject to suspension from USBC membership.

#### 6. HANDICAP:

Team Handicap basis – 100% (difference between team average and 1,100, 3-game total) added to the total score.

Singles Handicap basis – 90% (difference between average and 220, 3-game total) added to the total score.

In cases of tied scores, the Team or Single bowler with the lowest handicap will be the tie-breaker. If Teams or Single bowlers remain tied, prizes shall be split equally amongst the remaining tied Teams or Single bowlers.

#### 7. PRIZES:

Prizes will not be paid until the averages of all winners have been verified. Prize fees will be returned 100% on a ratio of at least one prize for every eight entries or a major fraction thereof.

#### 8. SUBSTITUTIONS:

In case of an absence, you may replace a team member with a substitute bowler. To be eligible, the substitute must be a person who bowled in the regional tournament from a non-qualifying team and meet all eligibility requirements. Team Captains may reach out to their Regional Bowling Coordinator for assistance in identifying potential substitute bowlers. The Tournament Director reserves the right to allow substitute bowlers that did not bowl in the regional qualifying tournament in the interest of fairness and fellowship.

The verified average and name of the substitute should accompany the team entry. For a substitute to be eligible for the singles event, he/she must replace a member in the team event. Substitution is limited to three and should be made at least one hour before the start time.

#### 9. LATE BOWLERS:

Any player or team, arriving late shall begin play and the score shall count beginning with the frame then being bowled. A bowler who misses one or more frames by not being present and ready to bowl when it is their turn shall not be credited with any pins for frames missed.

#### 10. GOVERNANCE:

Any issue not covered by these Tournament rules will be covered by USBC rules. The Tournament Director reserves the right to settle all disputes not covered by these rules or USBC rules.

Any person or persons who violate the rules of this Tournament individually or collectively shall forfeit their paid fees and any and all rights to claim or hold a prize awarded in this Tournament.

For conduct prejudicial to the best interests of the Tournament, the Tournament Director may impose such penalties as he/she shall deem necessary, including suspension from the Tournament.

If any of the eligibility rules are not adhered to, bowlers and their team will waive the right to any prize money and forfeit all fees paid.

All bowlers will be checked to determine their UAW Local and Region eligibility (spouses and retirees included). A non-union member will forfeit their entire team from the qualifying tournament.

It shall be the responsibility of each individual to complete and sign the "Bowler Information and Release Form."

If you do scan and email your documents, you still must send payment to the mailing address.

#### OTHER IMPORTANT INFORMATION

**Teams receiving prize payouts:** Each team member will receive a check from the International Union, UAW, in the amount of 1/5th of the prize money awarded for their team's placement position.

In order to receive any payments, **EACH** team member will be **REQUIRED** to complete a W9, ACH & Due Diligence form. These forms will be provided to the team captain once the official standings have been released. No team payments will be made to any team bowler until all five (5) bowlers have completed and returned all the forms, or a team member(s) has signed a "Prize Waiver" form. In which case, the prize money will be divided equally among the remaining members of the team.

**Single bowlers receiving prize payouts:** Any bowler placing in the Singles Event will be required to complete a W9, ACH & Due Diligence form to receive prize money. These forms will be provided to every single bowler once the official standings have been released. Upon return of the forms, the winning bowlers will receive a check or deposit from the International Union, UAW, in the amount of their prize winnings.

### A strike for justice

#### The UAW was a key player in knocking down racial barriers in bowling

Bowling has a way of creating solidarity outside the workplace like no other activity. Amid the repeated thumps of balls hitting the alleys and crashing into pins, we gather at our local alleys to compete and socialize with our union brothers and sisters. By the mid-1940s, it was America's most popular participation sport and remains popular among our members today.

As popular as it became, it was not always a sport that allowed everyone to bowl together.

Walter Reuther recognized that only white UAW members could enjoy the sport because the American

**Bowling Congress** (ABC), bowling's sanctioning body, limited participation in its events to whites at the nation's 75,000 alleys. Reuther could not accept that while our union was working hard to desegregate the workplace, that work was being undermined because of discrimination in society. A year after becoming UAW president

in 1946, he put the UAW at the forefront of the national movement The UAW's strong participation in desegregating bowling alleys is an important piece of our union's history, said Alyce Graves Kirk, a Local 6000 retiree who bowls in two leagues. While there may be some


who bowls in two leagues. While there may be some people who believe that unions should stick to issues within their workplaces, Kirk is thankful that her union took a stand for equal rights for all.

"It's one of the main things I think a union should fight for," Kirk said. The former eligibility specialist for the Michigan Department of Human Services added that

younger members of the union can learn a great deal from this moment in our union's history — and get involved to ensure rights are preserved.

In 1946, Father Charles Carow, a member of the ABC's executive board and of the executive committee of the Catholic Youth Organization in New York, petitioned the ABC

board to rescind its discriminatory policy to no avail. But his efforts


to desegregate bowling alleys across the nation.

"The UAW has an extraordinary history of commitment to diversity and fighting for the rights of all people. We have led the fight for equal rights in the workplace throughout the more than 85 years of our collective bargaining history," said UAW President Ray Curry.

It's with that history that some of the top bowlers from locals from across the nation will gather in suburban Detroit to compete in the International UAW Finals Bowling Championship. This tournament was first held in 1948 as a response to the ABC's discriminatory policy and the fact that the Detroit Bowling Proprietors' Association banned

caught Reuther's attention. Reuther soon instructed William H. Oliver, co-director of the UAW Fair Practices Department, to form a national committee to pressure ABC to desegregate. Reuther also gave Olga Madar, the director of the UAW Recreation Department who would later become the union's first female vice president, the task of eliminating racial bias in organized UAW bowling. The Recreation Department took the campaign to UAW locals across the country to get reluctant white bowlers to break with the ABC and the Women's International Bowling Congress (WIBC).

It wasn't easy work. John D'Agostino and Jess Corona, two Recreation Department staffers, were given the assignment of taking the campaign to bowling alleys



where UAW members bowled. D'Agostino told Solidarity magazine in 1995 that he recalled a particularly rough confrontation at a Detroit local.

"It was a very heated meeting. The members were very angry that we might take bowling away from them," said D'Agostino, who needed an escort by a local officer to ensure his safety when he left the meeting.

"We are not trying to deprive our membership of the right to bowl," he wrote one union local in Ohio. "But we would like them to bowl unsanctioned. How else are we going to break the un-American, un-democratic ABC organization?"

The UAW formed the National Committee for Fair Play in Bowling (NCFPB) and recognized it needed a strong personality with persuasive political skills to lead the committee and draw other prestigious Americans to the fight. Oliver and another union member, Joseph V. Tuma, went to Minneapolis to convince its young mayor, Hubert H. Humphrey, to chair the committee. Humphrey, a progressive who would later become a U.S. senator and vice president, was a strong labor supporter who formed his own aversion to racial discrimination while attending graduate school in the Deep South. Humphrey's participation helped draw notables such as World Heavyweight Boxing Champion Joe Louis, Women's Open Golf Champion Betty Hicks, NAACP President Walter White and others to the committee.

Soon, the UAW and other organizations decided to hold separate All-American Bowling Tournaments in major cities to compete with the ABC. The first was held in Detroit at the Eastern Market Rec Center and was the hardest to organize because many bowling proprietors, pressured by the Bowling Proprietors Association of Greater Detroit, refused to let the union use their lanes. Our union established the UAW International Bowling Championships and held the first one in January 1948 at Herbert Fenton's Dexter Recreation Center. Pressure began to build on the ABC as more tournaments were held and other prominent individuals and organizations joined the cause.

In March 1948, the ABC had an opportunity to rescind its racist policy but declined. Humphrey and the UAW were undeterred.

"Despite this decision, many of the organizations and people who have worked with us are now more determined than ever to guide our program to a successful conclusion, and they feel that, in so doing, victory will be ours," Oliver wrote to Humphrey, who wrote back:

"I am particularly encouraged when I read about the successful tournaments we are holding," Humphrey said in his letter. "It is very important to destroy by concrete action the myths and stereotypes and rationalizations which are used to defend discrimination."

In December 1948, the UAW, along with numerous other organizations, took legal action against the ABC, based on a New Jersey law outlawing discrimination. It delayed legal action until March of the following year, when the ABC again refused to lift the "whites only" clause. With Humphrey recently elected to the Senate, it was the UAW's Oliver who guided the effort to win the campaign. After a full year of legal wrangling in many states, the state of Illinois found that the ABC had violated its anti-discrimination law, fined it \$2,500 and threated to void its Illinois chapter. In August 1950, the ABC finally relented and its competitions were now open to all. The WIBC soon followed.

Desegregation in bowling came along slowly outside the UAW. Local 6000's Kirk remembers when she started bowling in the late 1970s, there were still bowling proprietors in non-UAW-affiliated leagues that practiced discrimination. She's proud of her union's role in desegregating the sport.

"I think if it wasn't for people in the UAW who put some of those ideas out there and got people to accept them, nothing would have changed," Kirk said.
